Proverbs 27:17 Iron sharpeneth iron; so a man sharpeneth the countenance of his friend.

Iron sharpeneth iron - We see this in the market: a butcher sharpening his knife with another iron rod. Iron tools are made sharp and fit for use, by rubbing them against the file, or some other iron. Why do we need to sharpen a knife? It is because it is blunt and, therefore, not very effective. To work more effectively with the knife, we sharpen it.

So a man sharpeneth the countenance of his friend. Solomon says here that a man's countenance can be sharpened in the same way that iron, or a knife, is sharpened. This proverb deals with the influence which men have upon one another. A countenance, also, can be *blunt*, otherwise why would the Bible speak here of a "sharpening" of it?

A knife can't sharpen itself! Like tools made of iron, we cannot sharpen ourselves. The notion that one can live in the wilderness alone for forty years to find enlightenment is absurd; he probably goes crazy first before he finds any enlightenment. God had said that it was not good that man should be alone (Gen 2: 18). God knows that we need one another. Therefore, God, in His infinite wisdom and mercy, sends others into our path. People who care enough to come alongside us, pick us up, brush us off, give us a helping hand, sharpen us when need be, and bring us back to the point that we are, once again, useful and productive for the Kingdom of God. At times the sharpening process can be painful, but praise God for those who care enough, and aren't afraid, to do it!

I mentioned earlier that a countenance can be "blunt". But what is a "blunt" countenance? It is that look of dismay and defeat which a face wears as a result of a

troubled heart. It is the countenance of discouragement, troubled, sorrow and hopelessness. Everyone of us has experienced it at one time or another in our lives.

But a sharpened countenance is the countenance of joy and gladness. It is the look of victorious cheerfulness. It is the radiance of hope on the face. Such countenance brings comfort, encouragement, life, jubilance and hope to one who has a "blunt" countenance. It is so sharp that when a problem comes against it, it cuts right through it.

Two sad persons coming together will grow in sadness. Two negative persons coming together will generate more negativism. But it takes only one optimistic person to change the situation. He can turn a sad countenance to joy and a negative outlook to a positive one. What has he done? He has just sharpened a sad countenance.

A sharpened countenance is like a knife that was blunt but has been sharpened. Someone has sharpened that "blunt" countenance.

"Yet it is not every man that can sharpen every other man, just as every material cannot sharpen knife. You have to be first a friend, before you can sharpen a "blunt" person. If you come as a fault-finder, or as a domineering critic, or as an offended `god,' or as an angry judge ready to pass judgment, you will worsen situations. Be a friend first, an understanding companion, then you can sharpen the bluntness of the friend's countenance." (Quotation).



A sharpened countenance could be a very effective tool. Make sure ours is always sharpened, and then, we can sharpen that of others. God tells us that we can be used to sharpen others. If a brother or a sister seems to walk alone, sharpen his or her "iron" by godly communication.

Job had three friends who came all the way to sharpen his sad countenance: **for they had made an appointment together to come to mourn with him and to comfort him** (Job 2:11). Paul had

Timothy, Titus, Philemon, and many others to refresh him.

Do you come to the services here to be sharpened? Sharpening the countenance of friends is a result of friendship. Do you have friends in the church?

We are to use our influence to sharpen our friends, our brethren, and especially the weak brethren. Just like tools, we need to be sharpened continually if we are to be useful in God's hands. And we need to be sharpened in order to be able to sharpen another. Are we sharpening another's "blunt" countenance?



Consider God's Creation—Think About God's Greatness



Christians in the 21st century think too little about God's creation; consequently, we think too little about God. We are so enamored with ourselves—our schedules, our work. technology, our extracurricular activities, etc., that we often fail to see the stars and smell the roses. Today, perhaps more than any time in history, man misses the apparently simple things in life that should cause us to meditate continually upon the greatness of the Creator. Of course, nothing is more important for Christians to meditate on than God's Word (Psalm 1:2; see Lyons, 2011), but in conjunction with God's special revelation (His Word), we ought to ponder about how God's amazing natural revelation testifies to His infinite power,



intelligence, and care.

Time and again, Holy Writ points to God's creation as proof of His greatness. Since the time of Job, Noah, and going as far back as Adam, man has learned some wonderful things about God by considering His amazing creation. Paul wrote: "Since the creation of the world His invisible attributes are clearly seen, being understood by the things that are made, even His eternal power and Godhead" (Romans 1:20, emp. added).



Perhaps no other book of the Bible leads man to deeper meditation on God's greatness than the book of Psalms. Yet, interestingly, oftentimes this same inspired book turns man's attention to God's creation. In Psalm 8, for example, the psalmist praised the excellent name of the Lord Who set His "glory above the heavens," Who made the Moon, stars, man, and even "the beasts of the field, the birds of the air, and the fish of the sea that pass through the paths of the seas." What did the psalmist conclude? "O Lord, our Lord, how excellent is Your name in all the earth!" (Psalm 8:9). In Psalm 19:1, we are reminded that "[t]he heavens declare the glory of God; and the firmament shows His handiwork." In Psalm 33, we learn of one of the reasons that humanity is to fear and


stand in awe of the Lord (33:8)—because "by the word of the Lord the heavens were made, and all the host of them by the breath of His mouth.... For He spoke, and it was done; He commanded, and it stood fast" (33:6,9).

Consider the climax of the book of Job, when God spoke to the patriarch out of a whirlwind. Instead of informing Job of the exact reasons for his serious suffering, God spoke to him about His creation. Beginning in Job 38:39 and going through chapters 39, 40, and 41, God spoke to Job about several different animals, including the lion, the hawk, Behemoth, and Leviathan. Of all of the things God could have said

to Job, He spent some 77 verses talking about some of His animal creation. He chose to teach Job about His all-powerful, all-knowing, supreme nature by describing some of His magnificent animal creation.

The prophet Isaiah once wrote about being allowed to see a vision of the throne of God. In the Lord's presence were angelic beings crying out one to another, "Holy, holy, holy is the Lord of hosts" (Isaiah 6:3). What is the basis of this praise? What is one reason we should be driven to worship God? Isaiah revealed one of the pillars of God's praise in the very next line: "The whole earth is full of His glory" (6:3).

Indeed, the beauty, splendor, and design of God's creation should drive us closer to the Creator. His "fingerprints" should make us stand in awe of Him. They should drive us to our knees in worship of Him. And they should compel us to tell others about Him. As the psalmist sang, we should "declare His glory among the nations, His wonders among all peoples. For the Lord is great and greatly to be praised" (96:3-4).
